Dementia Friendly Communities—follow up from last week:

Speak Clearly—calmly and slowly to allow the person time to understand information. Use simple, short sentences and avoid direct questions. Keep choices to a minimum and don't raise

your voice. Where possible, talk in a non distracting place. If the person struggles to find a word, then you could suggest one...but be careful not to interrupt or finish the sentence for them.

Body Language—People with dementia may find it difficult to understand what is being said, but can be quick to interpret the message on people's faces and be aware of body language. Smile warmly, make eye contact, make sure you are at the person's level, use a friendly tone and respect their personal space. (Adapted from the Alzheimer's Society)
