From Sunday's Gospel



When Jesus was a baby, his parents, Mary and Joseph, took him up to the Temple to present his to God and make an offering of two young pigeons. Now I the Temple there was a good and holy man named Simeon. The Holy Spirit had promised Simeon that he would not die until he had seen Jesus, the Light of the World. Prompted by the Spirit, Simeon came to the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to make

their offering, Simeon took Jesus in his arms and blessed God, and he said: "Now, I can die in peace because you have kept your promise. This child, Jesus, will be a light for all nations." Jesus' parents took him back to Nazareth where Jesus grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him. (From the gospel for Sunday 27th December 2020 Luke 2:22-40)



Pope Francis writes, "My dear young people, all God's children, of every people and language, are invited and called to be part of this great family, as brothers and sisters and sons and daughters of the one

Father in heaven." Today's word is **Family.** This Sunday we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family of Nazareth, Jesus, Mary and Joseph. In the gospel passage we read about the Holy Family's openness and obedience to God. Christmas is a special time for families, and this year because of the virus, we will not be able to meet together as in past years. Perhaps we might be helped by remembering that things were not easy for the Holy Family as we heard Simeon predicting that Jesus would be a 'sign that would be rejected' and that 'a sword would pierce' the soul of Mary. We might ask the Holy Family to help all our families at this time and to do what Pope Francis suggests, **"Dear families, always live in faith and simplicity like the Holy Family of Nazareth."**

Feast of the Holy Family



Every year the Church invites us to reflect on the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph on the Sunday after Christmas Day. This year Mark's Gospel will be our guide during Ordinary Time. As we know Mark does not have an Infancy Narrative so there are no details about Jesus' birth or early life, so the gospel passage chosen for today comes towards the end of Luke Chapter 2. It tells the story of the Presentation introducing us to two elderly people, Simeon and Anna. It is

Simeon who gives us the prayer the Church uses at Night Prayer every day of the year, the prayer called the 'Nunc Dimittis' - the first two words of the prayer in Latin. It is a prayer upholding the faithfulness of God and recognising Jesus as a Light for all the nations to see. But Simeon does not stop there, he speaks directly to Mary, telling her that her Son, despite being the Light to the Nations will in fact be 'a sign that is rejected', and not only that but a sword will pierce Mary's soul. So even in Luke's Infancy Narrative, there is the promise of difficult times ahead,

and we might want to commend to the intercession of the Holy Family those families we know who are experiencing great challenges, perhaps with children, or

elderly relatives, or taking into their homes those no longer able to care for themselves due to dementia or other conditions. Many families, too, will have been disappointed not to be able to get together this Christmas, both here and elsewhere throughout the world. We commend them all to the love and care of Jesus, Mary and Joseph.
