

From Sunday's Gospel

As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, "Look, there is the lamb of God." Hearing this, the two disciples followed Jesus. Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, "What do you want?" They answered, "Rabbi," – which means Teacher – "where do you live?" "Come and see," he replied; so they went and

saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour. One of these two (who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said) was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, "We have found the Messiah," - which means the Christ - and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, "You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas," – meaning Rock. #### Week of Prayer for Christian Unity



Monday 18<sup>th</sup> January is the beginning of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity which lasts until January 25<sup>th</sup>, The Feast of the Conversion of St Paul. Each year a group of people from different parts of world are invited to offer two

things: a reflection for each day and, secondly, the outline of a Joint Service normally celebrated on the Sunday within the Week. This year the materials have been prepared by an Ecumenical Group of Sisters in the Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland and they have taken for their theme 'Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit'. This passage of scripture is based on the 15<sup>th</sup> chapter of the Gospel of St John verses 1-17.

When they prepared the materials they could have had no idea that the COVID-19 pandemic would wreak such havoc in our lives. Here in Saddleworth we have very good ecumenical relations marked by various highlights. In 2020 we did manage to begin with our Joint Services during last year's week of prayer for Christian Unity. However, for some other joint services and activities we were able to come together. We missed out on the Good Friday Walk of Witness which has attracted increasing numbers over the years. The Whit Friday celebrations, together with the Band Contest were cancelled, though we did have a wonderful DVD presentation. The One World Fair, raising consciousness of different individuals and organisations working to alleviate poverty in the developing world, could not take place, neither could Carols round the tree. In addition the majority of the meetings of Churches Together and the Working Party took place virtually. We are beginning 2021 in a similar way as a more virulent strain of the virus has closed many churches and made large gatherings impossible, including any Joint Services planned for Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> January.

With this in mind, and given the importance of sustaining our ecumenical relations, I am offering a brief reflection each day of the Octave which will be accessible on the parish website.
