

When John the Baptist was preaching he said, "Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the straps of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will

baptise you with the Holy Spirit." It was at this time that Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptised by John in the River Jordan. No sooner had Jesus come up out of the water than he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit, like a dove, descending on him. Then a voice from heaven said, "You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you." (From the gospel for Sunday 10th January 2021, Mark 1:7-11 The Baptism of the Lord.)



St Gregory of Nazianzus writes, "My dear young people Baptism is God's most beautiful and magnificent."

Today's word is **Baptism.** IN this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus is baptised. He begins his mis-

sion to the world when the Holy Spirit comes down upon him—the same Spirit we receive through Baptism and Confirmation. Baptism is the first of the seven sacraments in the Church. It is only after we have been baptised that we can receive the other sacraments. It is the beginning of a life long call to reveal God's Spirit to our family and community. When we are baptised we become a new creation, we receive the Holy Spirit, the same Holy Spirit who descended on Jesus at his baptism, to help us live like Jesus. This Sunday brings an end to the Season of Christmas and we might want to ask ourselves how can we live more like Jesus during the coming year? As we read Mark's Gospel each Sunday we will get to know Jesus better and be able to imitate him more closely.

The Baptism of the Lord

This feast of the Baptism of Jesus brings an end to the Christmas Season and on Monday 11th we begin what is called Ordinary Time. This year there will be five and a half weeks of Ordinary Time before we begin the Season of Lent on Ash Wednesday, February 17th. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday on March 28th, and the Triduum begins on Thursday 1st April with the Mass of the Lord's Supper. Easter Sunday is on April

4th and the Season of Easter then will last until Pentecost on Sunday May 23rd. **Ordinary Time** begins again on Monday May 24th, though the first time we celebrate a Sunday in Ordinary Time will be June 13th which is the 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time.



The Gospel of Mark will be our guide both on Sundays and for the weekdays until Lent. Mark was the first person to put into some order the stories about Jesus which were being handed down orally. With the deaths of the Apostles and those who had been companions of Jesus, it be-

came necessary to have a written record of what Jesus said and did. Mark wrote his Gospel around the mid 60's, and he wrote it for those Christians who were suffering persecution under the Emperor Nero, who, without any evidence, blamed the Christians for the great fire of Rome, for which many historians believe he was responsible!

The Gospel is the shortest of the Four Gospels accepted by the Church and found in The New Testament. It had a great influence on Matthew and Luke who use it as well as other sources when writing their own Gospels. John's Gospel was the last to be written and is quite different in style from the other three 'Synoptic Gospels.' It is very fast moving, especially in the opening chapters which can leave us almost breathless. The opening words of the Gospel are 'The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God,' telling us from the outset that Jesus is both human and divine.



Requiem Mass for Mary (May) Collins

There will be a Requiem Mass for May at 12.00 noon on Monday January 11th in the Church of the Sacred Heart & St William.
