Today the priest does the same thing at Mass reminding us that this story wasn't just a huge, open air picnic, but also a sign of the Eucharist (Holy Communion) which Jesus would establish with his disciples at the Last Supper. Almost 2,000 years have passed since Jesus cared for and fed thousands of people. Jesus cares for us just the same today and through Holy Communion spiritually feeds millions of people throughout the world. Jesus is always with us, sharing his life with us both by what he says and who he is.

The current situation with regard to social distancing is likely to continue for the foreseeable future and so it is important to emphasise that those who volunteer are taking on a commitment which could well last for some time. When we open in September if stewards are missing or the cleaning has not been done the church cannot be opened.
