Then they said to one another, "Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?" Filled with joy, they set out immediately and returned to their friends in Jerusalem and told them all that had happened and how they had recognised Jesus in the breaking of bread.



Pope Francis says, "My young friends, each encounter with Jesus changes our life. Jesus is with us today! He is alive, Jesus is in our

hearts. Today's word is **Jesus.** Our lives are enriched when we know Jesus. He is with us at all times and in all places. We meet him in prayer and in other people. The more we know about Jesus through reading the gospels and talking about him, the easier it is to recognise him. Knowing and following Jesus helps our families to grow in love for each other and to be happy. Each of us can choose to do something this week to be more like Jesus. We might think about our favourite story about him, spend a little time in prayer, and if we have a decision to make ask, 'What would Jesus do?"

A Note from Nicaragua

When Fr Ernesto died on March 1st this year, I wondered if our links with Nicaragua would come to an end. I soon found out when the very next day I received an email from Fr Luis who had taken Fr Ernesto's place and moved into his house. One of the last things Fr Ernesto said to Fr Luis was to keep in

touch with me. I feel very honoured. He inherited the puppy and the mouse who remain good friends. In a recent email to Fr Luis I asked about his 'parish' and this is what he wrote:



"I have about 10/12 villages and they are from 10 minutes walk to 10 miles over mud track road. So you can see they have the breaking of bread when they or I can get to be together. Most things are by trucks, horseback or horse and cart and some cars that I am not sure how they hold together. Most of these villages do not have electricity and when they do have it, it is by a pump

that switches off at about 10pm at night. Then it is candles or cerosene lamps. The populations of the villages vary from about 1,000 to 3,000. The co-op operates for all of them and the system of sharing utensils, food, clothes, shoes, toys, books etc is part of that. A wonderful set up

My house has a kitchen with an arm chair and rocking chair. Then a bedroom and bathroom. The water comes from the well. So I carry water to the bathroom for a shower but the toilet does work as a toilet. I have to heat the water on the stove for washing myself. "

This is so hugely different from our own experience here in Saddleworth and it is good for us to know how other people are living in different parts of the world. Despite their lack of what we would utterly take for granted there is a care for others as shown by the establishment of the co-op as mentioned above. Virtually every day when Fr Luis opens the door to let the puppy out there is fruit, vegetables, bread and cheese left at his door, and a thoughtful hen lays a couple of eggs near where he lives! More next week.

We are used to phrases like 'self isolating' and 'social distancing' which are very much a reality in our daily lives, and, from recent comments are likely to remain so for some

time. So far we have been given no information as to how and when things might change, for the better. No doubt we will in the future but in the meantime even a change of emphasis can help. In Ireland they are replacing 'social distancing' with 'safe contacting', putting the emphasis on the positive rather than the negative. This can bring a sense of hope into an otherwise bleak situation, and all of us need HOPE especially at this time.
