Being on the receiving end of aggression is often frightening and distressing. When this has come from a person we are trying to help, we may also feel hurt and rejected. But if the person has dementia, we need to be aware that such behaviour is unlikely to be a deliberate act of aggression – in fact, it is much more likely to suggest fear or desperation.

If aggression does occur, the most likely reason is that the person is reacting to a distressing situation. The starting point in understanding aggressive behaviour from a person with dementia is to consider what might be going on from their point of view. Some reasons why a person with dementia might be aggressive include:

1. The person might be feeling unheard or misunderstood.

2. The person might be feeling threatened or frightened.

3. The person might be feeling embarrassed, frustrated or annoyed because they need help to do things they used to do independently.

4. The person might be asserting their own wishes when others are trying to make them do something they don't want to do.

5. The person might be in pain.
