First Holy Communion

I am very conscious that we were due to celebrate First Holy Communion this Sunday, the **Solemnity of The Body and Blood of Christ,** but with our churches still closed and the ban on public worship still in place, this will not be possible. I know all of us will join in the disappointment of the children and their families at this time. I just want to assure the children that I and our parish will do everything we can to make

sure that they are able to receive Jesus' gift of himself in Holy

Communion as soon as possible. It may be that we have to be creative in the way we do this, but guided by the Holy Spirit we will find a way.



With the thought of postponements in mind I would ask us to remember in our prayers The Revds Henry Longbottom and Darren Jones, two Deacons for our diocese who were due to be ordained as priests but whose ordinations have been postponed. Bishop Marcus has pencilled in dates for July but these will be subject to Government restrictions.

The Opening of Places of Public Worship



Recently we have been advised that the Government is giving permission for Places of Worship to be open for PRIVATE PRAYER from this Saturday June 13th. This comes just before the opening of shops and other amenities which

have hitherto been subject to lockdown. I am afraid this does NOT mean that I can simply leave the church open on Monday morning. There are stringent conditions to be fulfilled before Bishop Marcus will authorise any church in the diocese to be open and in line with other diocese there will be a pilot scheme with some of the larger, city/town centred churches opening first to see what the implications are going to be. I will, of course, try and keep everyone up to date with developments. At the time of writing this newsletter there is still no indication of when our churches will be able to open for PUBLIC WORSHIP, but I have been advised that this also will be phased. We have a moral as well as a legal obligation to make sure that the church will be a SAFE place to gather.

A Note from Nicaragua



Once again Fr Luis has been in touch by email following the celebration of Mass last Sunday, the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity. Nearly 700 people gathered to celebrate Mass at midnight their time, and some 250 were with Sr Anna Maria in her Barrio in a different part of Managua. It is wonderful that we are connect-

ed in this way and a real privilege for us in our parish to joined by so many people many of whom will have walked for miles, and all of whom wore protective masks and observed the necessary washing and safe distancing.

In the recent past we have celebrated the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart on the Sunday following the Friday's Feast Day. Having consulted with members of the Liturgy Committee we had different opinions so I asked Fr Luis what he thought. After consulting some of his people they were unanimous that they would like us to celebrate the Sacred Heart next SUNDAY which is what we will do. This will take the place of the 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time.



As we cope with coronavirus in the UK, we think of our sisters and brothers in developing countries who are facing this pandemic with fragile health-systems, some
