2nd Sunday after the Nativity



It is rare for us to celebrate the 2nd Sunday after the Nativity because for several years the Solemnity of the Epiphany was celebrated on this Sunday. We have the wonderful Prologue of John's Gospel this Sunday

which reads like a lyrical poem. It reminds us that God is both beyond our understanding, even our imagining, and yet chose to become one like us in all things but sin—The Word became flesh and dwelt among us! As we continue to celebrate the Christmas Season we are encouraged both to gaze into the crib and into our world, asking Jesus, the 'Light of the World', to shine on the dark places in our own lives, and to bring healing and peace to those who are living
